# WARDROBE ESSENTIALS


As a rule of thumb you should own at least as many suits as the number of days in the week that you typically wear one. So if you wear a suit four days a week, you should own at least four suits.

However, every man should own at-least two suits, and if you were to only ever own two suits, I'd suggest one navy and one charcoal. Each have their merits and by having the two colours to choose from you can match your image to each individual occasion. You also wont be mistaken for always wearing the same suit over and over again!


For these essentials we recommend opting for a mid-weight fabric that can be worn all year round. Aiming for nothing lighter than 9oz and nothing heavier than 11oz, with 10oz being ideal.






Tailors Tip: Adding a second trouser can increase your suit life by more than double!

Tailor Tip: Be sure to match the satin on the lapels to the buttons and bow tie.




# WARDROBE DEVELOPMENT

Once the essentials are covered, it is important to carefully add items to match your specific needs. Below is some guidance on the different types of businesswear and when you should consider investing in each.

Initially, for each item required we advise to continue with a mid-weight fabric of between 9-11oz, and where possible opt for a second trouser as this will dramatically extend the life of each outfit.




part of your regular rotation but this will also be the one that you can grab-and-go when you need to run out the door.

A travel suit is one that performs better at travelling than others, so can handle being rolled into a suitcase or carry on.

Also look for fabrics with a blend of mohair as this hollow fibre cannot be bent as easily so adds to the crease resistance and sharp silhouette.

Tailor Tip: Suits with a woven texture tend to resist and hide creasing better than a standard twill.



If you are regularly giving presentations to large audiences, managing a large team or entering adversarial negotiations, a power suit can be a useful tool to deploy.

Nothing denotes power more than a pinstripe suit.

The stripe works to emphasise the shoulders, chest and waist of the jacket, resulting in a more masculine figure.

Navy is the most popular colour as it denotes authority, which is why it is commonly worn by police forces around the world.

Tailor Tip: Be careful to match the width between each stripe to your frame. If you are larger, opt for a larger gap between stripes, if you are slimmer opt for a narrower gap.




# WHEN SHOULD I INVEST IN A GREY

Once you already have a navy blazer and are looking for more variety, a grey blazer is a good next choice! A textured grey blazer can look great with both black and navy jeans or chinos, as well as a lighter grey linen trouser in the summer months.

As with navy and grey suits, the grey blazer is more relaxed and informal than the navy blazer.

Again opt for a more textured fabric and contrasting buttons to differentiate it from your suit jackets but try not to go too out there with the pattern as this can restrict what shirt and trousers can be worn with it.

Tailor Tip: Patch pockets (where the lower pockets are sewn on to the outside of the jacket) help to create a more casual look.



**Tailor Tip:** Lighter colours give a more informal tone whilst a subtle pattern or texture adds some interest and helps to add some diversity to your wardrobe selection.



# WARDROBE EXCELLENCE

Once you have developed a year round wardrobe around your specific needs and are ready to evolve your collection to the next level, you should consider investing in a spring/summer and autumn/winter outfit for each of the previous categories. This will give you more variety whilst helping you to feel more comfortable throughout the year and allowing you to present a considered image by matching your style to the seasons.

In the UK, we advise that a spring summer outfit is one that you would feel comfortable wearing from April to November (just not in the depths of winter) and an autumn/winter outfit is one that you would feel comfortable wearing from October to May (just not in the height of summer).
